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## Call for Papers

**The Jungian Society for Scholarly Studies** was founded in 2002 by a group of academics seeking opportunities for scholarly discourse on psychology, focusing on the research and theories of C. G. Jung and those who have come after him. **TJSSS** organizes a yearly interdisciplinary academic conference through which members can present scholarly papers, organize roundtable discussions, and provide interactive workshops. Presentations are considered for publication in our e-journal.

**Proposals in the form of abstracts of 500 words or less are invited for papers, workshops, creative work, and/or panel presentations related to *Healing and Transformation for the Collective*. Please format your proposal so it can be published as an abstract in the conference program. We encourage submissions from students of Jungian Studies.**

**The Jungian Society for Scholarly Studies 2009 Conference welcomes papers that apply Jung's understanding of psyche, most of which focuses on individual healing and transformation, to the processes of healing and/or transforming the psychological causes of social ills. For example, we welcome papers on:**

- 1) **psychological issues affecting whether people attempt to subjugate or harvest differences when relating to those they conceive of as "other";**
- 2) **psychological issues influencing human-caused global problems currently threatening human life, including but not limited to warring fundamentalisms, degradation of the planetary means of life, increasing extremes of wealth and poverty, and xenophobia;**
- 3) **archetypal images, such as the earth as mother, holding promise for collective healing and transformation;**
- 4) **the arts bringing unconscious contents to collective consciousness;**

- 5) personal psychological journeys holding possible meaning for collective changes;
- 6) psychological illusions shadowing the idea of social transformation.

The above are only examples; other topics and perspectives related to the theme are welcome. Individual presentations will be limited to 20 minutes. Panel discussions may vary from 20 to 40 minutes.
